Campaign Against Presumptive Treatment of Malaria

This is to inform members of the University community about the following Federal Government of Nigeria's guidelines on treatment of malaria:

- 1. All persons suspected to have malaria must be tested in order to confirm or refute presence of Malaria Parasites in the blood.
- 2. Only persons who test positive should be treated for malaria.
- 3. The UHS has been provided with adequate support by the Federal Government through approved organizations like the President's Malaria Initiative (PMI)/USAID Roll Back Malaria, etc. to detect and treat malaria both during situations of power outage or availability of power.
- 4. In the best interest of the community and in order to avoid sanctions, the UHS will henceforth adopt the position of **'No! to presumptive treatment of malaria'.**
- 5. Our esteemed clients are advised to please cooperate with the UHS to maintain the above stated position.
- 6. It is pertinent to note that presumptive treatment of malaria (i.e. treating without testing) can result in resistance to the ACTs, possibility of unwanted side effects to a drug that shouldn't have been taken, masking of the real cause of illness which may therefore become complicated etc.
- 7. Join the UHS to say 'No! to presumptive treatment of malaria'.
